Results of May 2007 AP examinations, in which 411 students took a total of 982 exams in 26 subjects: 42% achieved a score of 3 or higher

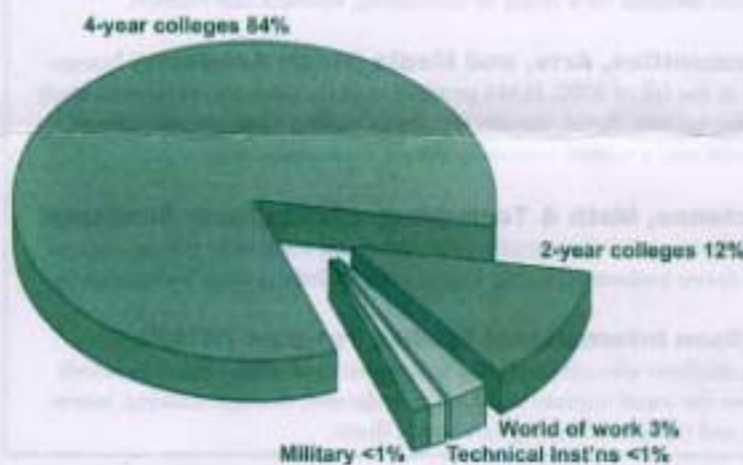

GPA is computed based on a 4.0 scale. Beginning with grade 9, all subjects, whether passed or failed, are included in the computation. Semester courses receive one-half the value of full-year courses. Weighted credit is given to AP (+1.0) and Honors (+0.5) classes. The median cumulative grade point average of the 2008 graduating class is 2.60.

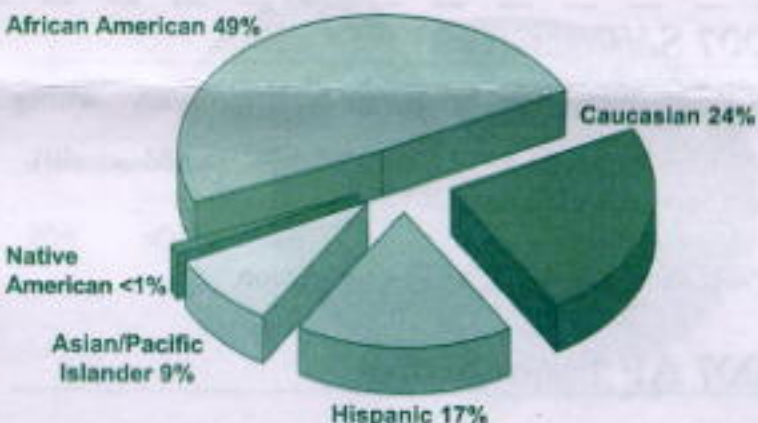

Woodrow Wilson High School, Washington, DC's largest and most diverse comprehensive public high school, is known for its academic excellence and its ethnic and economic diversity. Opened in 1935, the school currently enrolls 1,570 students in grades 9-12 and is accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Wilson is designated one of the 500 best high schools in America by Newsweek Magazine and the Washington Post Challenge Index (2003, 2004, 2005, 2006, 2007). They recognized the rigor of the academic program at Woodrow Wilson and "...put it in the top 3% of all secondary schools nationwide." More than 35% of the Wilson faculty are certified to teach AP classes in their field and the school currently has course offerings in 25 AP subjects. Nearly 40% of the student body qualifies for free and reduced lunch. Over 92% of the graduates of the Class of 2007 were admitted to post secondary colleges and universities.

Academies Alphabetically

Wilson students may apply to enroll in one of five academies:

Academic Athletic Achievement (AAA) Academy: This is a small learning community that focuses on career interest in health, fitness, sports medicine, and sports management. The Academy offers coursework for motivated students who are interested in developing specific talents in a pre-professional program.

Academy of Finance: Certified by the National Academy Foundation in 1998, this program gives students an introduction to the world of finance and entrepreneurship and provides paid internships. The program prepares students for a major in accounting, business and finance.

Humanities, Arts, and Media (HAM) Academy: Inaugurated in the fall of 2000, HAM provides opportunities for students to study philosophy, arts, dance, theater, television, radio and movie production. Students take a related internship during their senior year.

Science, Math & Technology (SciMaTech) Academy: Students specialize their studies and 12th-grade internship through one of three career pathways (Health, Engineering & Information Technologies).

Wilson International Studies Program (WISP): Since 1983, students who are interested in international affairs have intensively studied the social sciences and foreign languages, through training, internships and travel culminating in a senior thesis.

The **HI/SCIP program** (High School/College Internship Program) enables academically talented seniors to enroll in freshman courses and earn college credits at local institutions of higher education without tuition cost. Participating universities are American University, Catholic University, University of the District of Columbia, The George Washington University, Georgetown University, Howard University, University of Maryland at College Park, Southeastern University, and Trinity University.
